Public present: Collette Cole

I. Call to order

Jill called the meeting to order at 12:05 PM.

II. Approval of minutes from January 7 meeting

Ruth moved to approve the minutes. Tara seconded. All in favor. Motion carried.

III. Business and Finance

A. January Treasurer's Report

On December 31, 2021, ABC had a beginning balance of \$24,833.82. We had deposits totaling 7,726.62 from Season of Giving campaigns and our Anonymous Donor. There were no withdrawals. The ending balance on January 31, 2022 was \$32,560.44. Jill moved to approve the Treasurer's Report. Tara seconded. All in favor. Motion carried.

B. 2021-2022 Budget Overview

ABC has a strong income for the school year and less expenses than anticipated to date.

C. Spring Fundraiser discussion

It was decided it would be best to postpone having an in person fundraiser. We will reassess in the Fall.

D. Snack booth at Trails Day June 4

The organizers are expecting about 300 people between 9 AM - 4 PM. We are welcome to set up a table and pop up for the entire event or part of it. In addition to snacks and coconut water, we will have a tip jar and will bring the square device for potential donations. Jill will check with the organizers about where exactly the event is being held, who the audience is, and the purpose so we can decide what type of snacks/treat it might be best to bring.

IV. Programs

A. Career Lunch

The group decided that since it is getting late in the school year, it would be best to relaunch Career Lunches next year. We can re-brand the event, survey students to see what speaker professions they might be interested in, and do some promotions around it. There was discussion about how to possibly incentive students. The idea of soliciting questions from students at the time they sign up for the lunch in the counseling office. Tara will send the old survey to Jill. Jill will work with Tara and Collette on working on a new survey for students to fill out.

B. On the Right Track

Tara explained that this event is meant to prepare seniors with life skills like how to open a bank account, balance a checkbook, buy a car, etc. Calaveras County has set it up like the game of life where students spin a wheel and move to a task depending on their spin. It gets them thinking about how they will provide for themselves and potential future family. It includes mock interviews. Tara believes Calaveras has done this as a half day event. The woman who created did trademark the event but now has ties with Mariposa so may be willing to share her materials. There are 93 seniors this year. Tara believes she would be able to get gift bags for the seniors from a source like the Chamber. The big question is whether we have

enough time to set this up for May of this year (exact date TBD based on MCHS testing schedule for freshman through juniors). Tara will check in with her contact and email information to the board when she gets it so we can get started if necessary before our next meeting.

C. Personal Best Awards proposal

Collette let Jill know that in order to move forward with Personal Best Awards this year, the counselors suggested ABC come up with a proposal that they can run by Celeste for approval. Jill noted this has been in our plans for a number of years but due to time limitations of high school staff, it hasn't happened. Jill suggested ABC take back responsibility for it from MCHS. We could set it up like a scholarship like so many other outside agencies do, update the application accordingly, make it clear that this is not for high achieving students who already get a lot of awards and recognition, but rather for students who may have been struggling but have made significant strides in their academic goals this school year by perhaps raising an entire letter grade from failing to passing, successfully completing credit recovery, or something similar. We talked about not offering a cash prize before because then all students might be tempted to apply, but maybe if we make it very explicit about who this award is for, we can offer cash. Or we could offer a choice of cash, cell phone minutes, gas card, or whatever students might want. Collette and counselors would help us advertise this to students. ABC would have a committee to read the applications. We would want to do this blindly - not knowing who submitted them. We would have a matrix to score them. We would be looking at the content of what they have done - not looking for a perfect essay with perfect sentences. One winner per grade level. All agreed this sounded like a good plan and were favorable to Jill's suggested changes on the application MCHS used for this award years ago, last time in 2009. Jill will put a proposal together for Collette.

D. Valedictorian Dinner planning

Collette let us know that there are potentially 20 students who could be named valedictorians this year. Looking at getting a number for the event:

Students + their guests = 80

Speaker, speaker guest, MC, principal = 4

Helpers = 7 last time, more like 10-11 people would be needed for this number of guests (included for the calculation of space needs, not part of the actual dinner count).

Ruth will check with Sierra Tel to see if its sponsor program is running this year. There was a discussion of potential other sponsors, but it was inconclusive.

There was a discussion of how we might be able to cut costs without cutting quality of event. We will move away from the commemorative brochures and back to the one sheet program which will save a few hundred dollars. We will still give gift cards, but maybe we don't need to give plants. Other ideas were discussed, but it was also pointed out that the biggest cost is food. Last year's food cost was large (\$30/person) with not huge, but unexpected alcohol costs (around \$80). It would be good if we could keep the food cost to about \$20-22 per person.

There was a discussion around food costs and potential venues. Naoko mentioned that maybe the new owner of Savoury's would be willing. Building A at the Fairgrounds was mentioned. But given Covid unknowns, people voiced preference to keep it outside again this year. The conclusion was that Ruth will check with The Grove House as our first choice since it is outside, a large space, maybe the chef could provide the protein and starch, and maybe they would allow us to bring the salad, rolls, and cake ourselves which would greatly cut down on cost.

Ruth noted that she will be able to do the majority of getting ready and set up for this event. We may need more helpers the night of given the numbers of guests.

V. Succession Planning/recruiting new members

The group discussed ways to find new members for next year who might be able to take on leadership roles the following year. Everyone was encouraged to think of who might be a good

fit. Jill will reach out to elementary school middle school teachers and principals about active parents. This will be an ongoing discussion.

VI. Open Forum

There was discussion about the weekly bulletin. In past years, the bulletin put together by the Leadership class has been very useful to parents in keeping informed about what is going on at school. This year, it contains much less information. Some of us don't even open it anymore because we are not finding it useful. Collette will convey this feedback and see if anything can be done to improve the bulletin.

VII. Set Date, Time, and Location for Next Meeting

Our next meeting will be Friday, March 11, noon, via Zoom.

VIII. Adjourn

The meeting adjourned at 1:30 PM.

A “Hands On” Experience Designed to Empower Our Youth

In this training, students will be playing a life size board game that takes the game in a different direction. The instructions of the game can be altered to reflect different social classes and different policies and practices reflecting those circumstances.

This life-like simulation immerses the student in fast paced hands-on learning where they are faced with difficult real world decisions. Life is full of surprises and most have consequences both good and bad. Learning to choose wisely is the key to this activity.

The “On the Right Track” program has a number of fun activities built into the day. Through the collaboration of our community partners, we will provide a fun filled learning experience designed to keep our youth “On the Right Track” as they transition into the next phase of life. This event will offer an opportunity for our schools, business communities, county offices and residents to come together to prepare our next generation to successfully navigate through many situations. Situations they will encounter during their lifetime, but ones that are not taught as part of the standard curriculum.

ABC is therefore suggesting that we take over responsibility for administering the award just as many outside agencies set up scholarships for graduating seniors.

We would need Collette Cole and the Counseling Office's help in making students aware of the availability of the award and in collecting applications. As you'll see from the attached draft application, we suggest that ABC receive these applications in a way that would allow us to not know who submitted them. ABC would form a committee to read and score the applications based on significant academic progress (rather than on the writing ability of the students - this isn't a writing contest).

We are suggesting one winner per grade level and a prize of \$250 cash.

We are open to suggestions regarding the application itself, its timing, and the cash prize. Let us know what you think.

**MCHS Academic Boosters Club
Personal Best Scholarship
2022**

This annual scholarship is open to all Mariposa County High School students in grades 9-12 who have achieved significant academic growth during the school year, whether it be raising a failing grade to a passing grade, complete a credit recovery program, working with a teacher or tutor to bring up a grade by one full letter, or some other similar significant achievement toward a personal academic goal. Applicants must submit all of the following:

- an application,
- an essay explaining how you feel you have achieved your personal best,*
- two recommendation letters, one from a teacher and the second from either a teacher or an MCHS staff tutor. One teacher must be from a core academic subject (English, Math, Science, History).

All applications must be received by the Counseling Office no later than 3pm Thursday, April 28, 2022.

There will be four awards, one per grade level, given annually to students who clearly demonstrate the achievement of their personal academic best during the school year. A student may only receive the award once during their education at Mariposa County High School.

The award is \$250.
