I. Call to order

Jill called the meeting to order at 12 PM.

II. Approval of minutes from March 18 meeting

Tara moved to approve the minutes. Ruth seconded. All in favor. Motion carried.

III. Business and Finance

A. 2021-2022 Budget Overview

Jill noted that we do not have a March Treasurer's Report but it will be included in the next meeting agenda. For the budget overview, Jill noted she sent a letter to Premier Valley Bank in January, but we have not received a donation this year. The name of the bank changed recently; maybe there were behind the scenes changes at the bank that affected donations as well. We don't know. Our finances are still fine without the bank's usual \$500 donation.

IV. Programs

A. Staff appreciation week, May 2-6

We discussed and approved buying gift cards for staff at the beginning of the school year and it is in our budget. Jill received a list of 50 staff members from Collette. Like she did last year, Jill will write personal thank you notes to all staff. She will buy \$20 gift cards from The Alley, Pony Espresso, The Grove House, and Sticks. Collette is willing to keep the gift cards at her desk so staff can come choose the one they would like, first come, first served. Jill will try to get everything to Collette by Wednesday of next week.

B. Valedictorian Dinner planning

The dinner is scheduled for May 25 at The Grove House. Today, April 29, is the end of a grading period. Collette hopes to have the final list of names to ABC by next week. There will be between 12-14 valedictorians.

Celeste's office puts together the information to the valedictorians regarding the invitation to the dinner, request of student photo and bio, request of knowing who is coming, who the mentor is, whether attendees would like a regular meal or vegetarian. Ruth will find out from The Grove House what the meat option will be.

Night of: Ruth will go with Rya around 3 to start setting up. She will have table cloths, flowers in small vases. She will work on a seating chart and may ask for help. Jon-Paul will bring and set up a sound system. They are all set with the cake which Naoko is paying for. Kendra Wilde, Jill, and Collette will come help the night of. Jill will take photos.

Once we have the valedictorian names, Jill will give the names to Sierra Tel for the portfolios they are giving out, buy the \$50 gift cards making sure they don't expire any time soon.

Celeste will let us know who the MC will be (likely Ms. Hays) and who the guest speaker will be. We'll ask if the high school can let students know mentor speakers should plan on speak-

ing for about 3 minutes each though of course we won't cut off anyone. Collette will help us track down student bios, photos, etc. Once we have all of this, we'll put together the one page, program.

C. On the Right Track update (see <https://otrcalaveras.com/>)

On Monday, Tara went to Brett Harte HS to observe the event in action. There's a "town square" in the center where students are given scenarios to work through. In addition, they also spin a wheel in the middle of their scenario where they find themselves with an unexpected life event they have to figure out. There are booths set up all around a field with a number of businesses and organizations for the students to interact with as they work through their given scenario and life event. Tara spoke with the creator/coordinator, Stacy, about in the future allowing students to visit every booth after they finish their scenario. There is time for this. They also have restaurants bring in lunch.

The Calaveras Chamber puts on the events. They make it a fundraiser with the participating businesses/organizations paying sponsorship fees. Calaveras had \$3,500 in costs the first year, much less after that. Tara noted we would have about half the number of students participating as they have given school enrollment numbers.

Collette and Robin Dormer are scheduled to go to the event at Calaveras HS next Thursday to observe. Tara recommended they introduce themselves to Sheri Grosch, Calaveras Chamber director, and Stacy, the creator and organizer. They will be at the Town Hall and Calaveras Mariposa Community Action Agency booth.

Collette said the high school would be interested in doing this event next spring, a year from now, maybe March/April before spring break to give them time to organize. Tara suggested the event happen in the fall when her CMCAA contacts are more likely to be available to help - they have said they are willing to do so.

Tara clarified that this is not an event that the high school arranges, but rather, she in her role as Mariposa County Economic Development Manager, would arrange it. All the high school has to do is supply is the students and the location. Collette asked that Tara send an email to Celeste explaining this as she believes there is some confusion about this and Tara would be the best person to clarify it.

D. Personal Best Awards - applications due date Apr 28

Collette received 10 applications altogether from freshman, sophomores, and juniors, none from seniors. She will package them up and get them to Jill today or Monday.

Jill received a scoring rubric and score sheet from Brooke Dobson from when the high school used to do this award. This was extremely helpful. Jill modified the rubric to match our application and also based on her experience judging the Tech Trek application process with AAUW.

Jill asked if anyone was interested in scoring the applications based the rubric in addition to herself. Ruth volunteered. Jill will check with Leigh as well.

There was discussion on whether it would be best to give winners gift cards or checks. Jill will work with Collette to decide what would be best on a case by case basis.

E. Career Lunch Survey and Relaunch Discussion

The survey is finished. MCHS received 130 responses. Collette needs to go through them and will get the responses to us as soon as she is able.

V. Misc

A. Succession Planning/recruiting new members

Katie Pike sent Jill a long list of Woodland parents who might be interested in ABC. Jill will put together an email inviting them to join in our meetings next year. Jill believes in order to successfully recruit, we will need to move to evening meetings next school year and continue to use Zoom for convenience. Everyone agreed Tuesdays at 6 PM would work. Ruth suggested

another possible parent, will reach out to her, and will let Jill know. If she is interested, Jill will add her to the introduction/invitation email that she is going to put together.

B. Update on School weekly newsletter

It is up and running using the format Ms. Dobson created.

VI. Open Forum

There were no items for open forum.

VII. Set Date, Time, and Location for Next Meeting

Our next meeting will be Friday, April 27. It was noted we definitely need to discuss On the Right Track and Career Lunches in order to get them going at the start of next school year. We will also need to debrief re Valedictorian Dinner to decide with whether we will stick with Grove House or will need to find a new venue for future years.
